Problem Definition Context: The Western Undergraduate Exchange (WUE) program allows out-of-state prospective students to attend Evergreen school for 150% of the in-state tuition (WICHE 1). Compared to the average of 300% most institutions charge out-of-state students. However, the campus Office of Admissions' written nature of the policy lacks clarity and is thus enforced irregularly. This is a light observation of the Evergreen policy adaptations made.

The Evergreen State College joined the Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education (WICHE) and became a part of the WUE program as of Fall 2019 (https://www.evergreen.edu/admissions/wue). Partly due to the variable nature of WUE (and thus unfamiliarity with corner cases) it doesn't always serve students well or consistently. The campus policy states on the Admissions page "'*Freshmen' is defined as a student of any age that has not earned college credit after graduating from high school. Students who have earned credit through a college-in-the-high school program or through exams may qualify for WUE as long as all credits were earned prior to high school graduation.*"

However frequently students that earned college-in-the-high school but waited a gap period to apply *after* graduating high school (informally referred to as a "lagged" high school student), have historically been not considered in the same category. Though WUE allows for exceptions to be made by the institution. Essentially this penalizes a majority of students that did not apply right away, causes panic/requests for exemptions, and limits the benefits they can obtain from WUE. A potential solution could be creating updated definitions to more clearly outline intended demographics, or making it more publicly known there is an exemption process.
