## Accreditation

Peninsula College is accredited by the Northwest Commission on Colleges and Universities, an institutional accrediting body recognized by the Council for Higher Education Accreditation and the United States Department of Education. ## Quarter System

Peninsula College offers 11-week quarters Fall, Winter, and Spring, and one seven-week quarter during Summer. One lecture credit is equivalent to 11 contact hours per quarter, and one laboratory or studio credit is equivalent to 22 contact hours per quarter.

**Degree Requirements** - Degrees with the pound symbol (#) or followed DTA and/or MRP indicate the degree conforms to statewide articulation guidelines. Use of the # symbol began Fall Quarter, 1985, and use of the DTA coding system began Spring Quarter, 2001. All degrees require at least a 2.00 college-level GPA.

If not completed within one year, the I grade will remain on the transcript, and no credit will be granted.

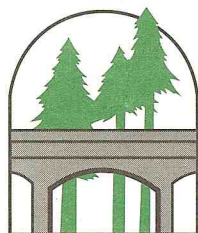
## "Y" Continuing Grade

The Y grade was formerly offered to students who enrolled in a course and made satisfactory progress, but were unable to complete requirements during the quarter enrolled. A Y indicated that a student did not progress far enough to earn a satisfactory grade or an I grade. A student who earned a Y grade had to subsequently reenroll in the course to earn credit for the coursework. No credit was granted for a Y grade.

## "Z" Continuous Enrollment

The Z grade designates a "Continuous Enrollment" course administered through the Department of Corrections. No grade points are calculated in the GPA and no credit is granted.
