I am compelled to integrate my professional and life experience, my academic learning and future graduate work, in public policy and public administration.

In 2019, I decided to return to college while working as a national accounts manager. I was determined to fulfill my goal of earning my BA so that I could further my education and apply my skills outside of the corporate realm. After leaving my Six-to-Five I was better able to expand my writer's mind by dedicating myself fully to the coursework at Central Washington University's (CWU) online degree program in English: Professional and Creative Writing. At this juncture, I once again found a voice that could emanate from my authentic self. The challenge was how do I integrate my socially conscious, artistic and poetic side with my passion for detailed and productive work while collaborating with others?

Though I attended university online, my cohort and academic family became a part of my pandemic survival plan. I felt deeply connected with other students, faculty, writers and artists by paying deep attention to the message in their writing as they did for me. The trust and

relationship I built with my cohort aided my work on the editorial team for Manastash, Vol.32. I worked extensively with other editors to curate the Spring 2022 edition which focused on wellness and coping. I was also a contributor to Vol. 32 as my poetry and photographs were selected by committee and published. There is a deep sense of purpose in combining written and visual artwork in collaboration with other learners in a public college setting. I found myself thrilled with the idea of enriching the minds of fellow and future students. Consistent with this, I infused my approach to editing and writing with respect, understanding, and acknowledgement of the perspectives of multicultural and diverse contributors. I was engulfed in the momentous energies of collaboration on a wider scale. The energy was momentous in the way that the editorial committees and artists brought different points of view together in unison. We harnessed and promoted a publication that addressed the needs of the common good. This was a common good that respected difference, individual expression and how we communicate to others as equals.

I am deeply analytical, and in the formalized peer review process in all of my writing classes, I honed not only my writing skills but my *listening* skills. My cohort was diverse, creative and powerful. In the peer review process; I read works that were written by students living throughout the U.S. My student cohort at CWU consisted of writers from diverse ancestries and languages. This necessitates research on land record databases as well as multiple news archives. The more I research, the more I learn about state and federal requirements for nonprofits. I observe how research, public policy and knowledge can fuel advocacy and more just outcomes.
